

# Brill to Boarstall Walk

## Bernwood Jubilee Way

**Total walk distance 9k (5.5miles)**



**Car Parking is limited - parking at the Brill Windmill and near the red lion public house.**

- 1.** Walk begins on Tramhill adjacent to Temple Farm
- 2.** The walk turns left up a small passageway opposite the Fire Station
- 3.** On reaching a cricket pitch turn right towards a large linear earthwork
- 4.** All Saints Church was originally a private chapel - King John improved the church in 1225
- 5.** At the village green bear left along Brill Road then take a narrow footpath that runs between a group of houses
- 6.** Proceed through the kissing gate and bear along the track towards South Hills
- 7.** Brill Common is of great ecological interest - there is a good view of the countryside around Boarstall
- 8.** Skirting around a small cottage the route descends through a number of small field enclosures
- 9.** On the left of the first field is an earthwork which may be the remains of a dam and fish pond
- 10.** Water mint is present by the stream and has a pleasant aroma
- 11.** A veteran English Oak is present, close to the path
- 12.** The path emerges onto a country lane beside Span Green and Touchbridge
- 13.** Follow the road along the edge of Muswell Hill until it meets the B4011
- 14.** The path continues westwards towards Manor Farm
- 15.** The walk follows the road south towards Boarstall Tower and the parish church
- 16.** The parish church of St James was a dependent of Oakley from C12
- 17.** Crossing opposite the church a walker can continue back to Brill
- 18.** The trail heads south across pasture towards Boarstall Wood
- 19.** The point of access into Span Green is gained by crossing the main road and rejoining a footpath opposite Boarstall Wood Cottage

**The walk along Span Geen ends at Touchbridge where the walker can return to Brill by retracing the journey through points 12 to 1 along the Bernwood Jubilee Way**
